Increasing Defence Diplomatic Presence in the Pacific



INCREASING DEFENCE DIPLOMATIC PRESENCE IN THE PACIFIC

Proposal



Government priorities

2. This paper supports the Government priority area to create an international reputation New Zealand can be proud of through expanding the NZDF presence in the Pacific, contributing to the Pacific Reset strategy.

Background

3. New Zealand's Pacific Reset, announced in March 2018, responded to regional challenges with a lift in our strategic ambition and investment in the Pacific. Key to delivering on defence aspects of our Pacific partnerships is the presence in the region of Defence Advisers. Defence representation in-country underpins defence partnerships and people-to-people ties. Defence Advisers multiply our effectiveness across all our activities with those partners and support New Zealand Inc coordination.

Review of New Zealand's existing Defence presence in the Pacific

4. New Zealand currently has three Defence Advisers in the South Pacific who hold resident and non-resident accreditations to eight Pacific Island countries. Following the Pacific Reset, Defence reviewed the current placement of Advisers to determine whether they were optimally placed.

5. The review identified limitations with two of the three existing positions:

Resident	Accreditations	Review findings
Defence Adviser in Fiji	Tonga	Engagement with Fiji has grown. Portfolio is too large, with Tonga underserved. Changes proposed.
Defence Adviser Pacific (located in Wellington)	Cook Islands Niue Samoa	Role is currently combined with the position: Deputy Director Strategic Engagement. Portfolio is too large when combined with Wellington responsibilities, no room for growth. Changes proposed.
Defence Adviser in Papua New Guinea	Solomon Islands Vanuatu	S6(a) No change proposed.

Fiji engagement demands greater Defence Adviser resource

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. The scale of engagement in Fiji has become
too demanding for the resident Defence Adviser to manage while concurrently
maintaining similar responsibilities with Tonga.

Tonga is underserved

7. New Zealand has a positive and longstanding defence relationship with Tonga, underpinned by historical ties and strong people-to-people links. However, while defence engagement with Tonga has grown, s6(a)

Tonga is the only Pacific country with a defence force where New Zealand does not have a resident Defence Adviser.

Strategic Commitments to the Pacific have grown

8. The Wellington based Defence Adviser Pacific is accredited to Samoa and the Realm countries of the Cook Islands and Niue. The position is dual-roled as the Deputy Director Strategic Engagement – Regional, in the Strategic Commitments and Engagement Branch of Headquarters NZDF. Since the Pacific Reset, it is beyond the capacity of one Full Time Equivalent staff officer to hold both positions, constraining effective engagement with Realm countries.

A need to establish new representation has emerged

11. Enhanced Defence representation throughout the Pacific will help facilitate the building and sustainment of people-to-people ties, and increase New Zealand Defence's cultural and regional awareness. It will also enhance the effectiveness of Defence to both coordinate existing activities (e.g. fisheries patrols), and respond to emergency situations (e.g. natural disasters).

Proposed changes to the Footprint

12. I propose the following changes to the Defence Adviser network in the South Pacific to address the limitations described above (see map at Annex A):

Resident	Accreditations	Changes
Defence Adviser Fiji (Existing)	s6(a)	s6(a) Accreditation to Tonga removed.
Defence Adviser Tonga (New)	s6(a)	New resident position established in Tonga. S6(a) S6(a)
Defence Adviser Pacific (Existing)	-	s6(a)

Alignment with New Zealand's Interests

13. The additional Defence Adviser s6(a) would be a s6(a) valuable lift to New Zealand's presence in the Pacific. This would send an important signal to our Pacific partners about our commitment to the region.

COVID-19 Implications

14. The plan was for the Defence Adviser Tonga to start in July 2020. Given the COVID pandemic and possible requirement for assistance to the Pacific, this could occur earlier should conditions allow and administrative arrangements be in place.

Next Steps

15. Should Cabinet approve, agreement would be sought from host governments to establish or change accreditations.

Financial Implications

16. There are no financial implications for this paper, as the costs can be met within Vote Defence Force. NZDF are able to fund the ongoing costs to establish a resident Defence Adviser in Tonga through cessation and reapportionment of operational expenditure currently expended on other NZDF staff deployed offshore in non-operational roles. Travel costs associated with s6(a) will also be provided within NZDF baselines through prudent management of wider Defence Attaché and Adviser travel requirements.

Consultation

17. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet and Treasury have been consulted on these proposed changes to the Defence Adviser network in the South Pacific.

Communications

18. I propose to announce the increased footprint prior to its establishment, at a date to be confirmed following consultation with partner governments.

Proactive Release

Recommendations
